Please read carefully. The following is essential information for helping you determine whether your project needs IRB review. There is a question at the end of this form that refers to this information.

Projects meeting the regulatory definition of research with human subjects require review and approval by an IRB, or a determination that the research is exempt from oversight. The Harvard University-Area IRB makes these determinations project-by-project.

Not all activities that involve people, their data, or specimens are covered by the regulations governing human subjects research, though! In determining if review is needed, the IRB considers 1) whether a project fits the regulatory definition of research and, if so, 2) whether it

also involves human subjects.

Federal regulations define research as “a systematic investigation, including research development, testing, and evaluation, designed to develop or contribute to generalizable knowledge.” **Let’s break this down a bit:**

- *Such projects have a well-defined research question/hypothesis/aim and a way to address that question. That is, something you are trying to find out and a way to find it out, like through collecting information from people. This is a systematic investigation.*
- *Such projects also aim to produce something (like a journal article, presentation, data for a repository, etc.) that is useful, usable, and accessible to others. That is, the outcome of the project has the potential to be impactful on your discipline or field. This is generalizable knowledge.*
- *In these projects, having an academic or personal growth experience is likely to be a secondary goal of the project, not the primary goal.*

Note that some activities look like research but may not need IRB review:

- **A quality assurance/quality improvement/organizational effectiveness study** where intent is to assess, improve, or develop programs or services for an organization. Outcomes will remain specific to that organization and thus are not generalizable as above.
- **An oral history or journalistic piece**, since projects strive to document and report on events, situations, policies, institutions, or systems as they are, without the intent to form or answer research questions or draw general conclusions. These procedures are most typical within History programs.
- **A project that is intended to be an educational experience for academic credit** and/or an experience to explore a topic for personal growth. In such cases the project is not intended to produce something (e.g., journal article, presentation, data, etc.) that is useful, usable, and accessible to others. That may be a goal in the future, but it is not a goal at the outset.
- **A literature review** may involve obtaining, reading, and synthesizing lots of published information. This information is usually very accessible and/or not about individual people and thus falls outside IRB oversight.

How do you think your project fits? This form will focus on whether what you are doing is considered research as we define it. There is a question about this at the end of the form.
